Descendants of Jacob Allaman

[beginning is missing] is now Lower Swatava township and belonged to the Lutheran Church at Middletown, Dauphin County, Pennsylvania. He and his wife are buried near Ebenezer Church.

Children were 1. Henry (married Catherine· Holler). Years later his grandson Henry founded Allemanville, Pennsylvania. 2. David (married Miss Shelly). 3. Samuel (married Elizabeth Barnhart). 4. Rachel, (married Michael Barnhart). 5. Elizabeth (married Jefferson McNeel. 6. Christian 7. John (did not marry, moved to California) 8. Peter. 9. Benjamin. 10. Etta.

43. Catherine was born February 14, 1761. She married Mr. Kreighbam and is buried near Canton Ohio.

44. Leonard was born December 12, 1763. He married Barbra [missing], and lived in Annville township, Lebanon County Pennsylvania. He died September 14, 1832 and is buried on his farm.

Children were 1. Valentine 2. Magdalena 3. John 4. Catherine 5. Leonard 6. Benjamin

45. Regina married Martin Miller.

46. Magdalena (Margaret) was born March 26, 1765 and died August 1831. She married Philip J. Shutt.

Children were 1. John Jacob born March 29, 1790; died July 26, 1836. 2. Catherine Elizabeth born May 7, 1792; died January 28, 1863. 3. Margaret sometimes called Rebecca, the second time married George Stine and had a child named Mary born January 5, 1804; died 1875.

441. Valentine born May 27, 1787 died in 1840. Records in St. Lukes [sic] Evangelical Lutheran Church located at Shafferstown, Lebanon County Pennsylvania state "Valentine Alleman, son of Leonhardt and Barbara; baptized 29 July 1787. Children were 1. Elizabeth 2. Jacob 3. Valentine 4. [missing] (Father of Henry Allaman 44143) 5. [missing] Mother of George Washington Frey who lived near Kent, in Stephenson

County Illinois. In a letter to Jacob dated March 16, 1868, George mentions his brother Solomon Frey, and sisters Jennie, Nancy Delp, Sarah, and Martha Bogenreif. There may have been other children but no records have been found at this time.

442. Magdalena born February 26, 1789 died April 18, 1830.

443. John born September 9, 1795; died January 1, 1819.

444. Leonard born December 1, 1779; died January 22, 1869.

445. Benjamin born December 1, 1799 died August 17, 1871. He married Sarah Saeger.

4411. Elizabeth. Zions Evangelical Lutheran Church located at Jonestown, Lebanon County, Pennsylvania has a record of "Elizabeth born January 28, 1810 baptized March 16, 1810 child of Valentine and Barbara Alleman." Nothing more is known about her.

4412. Jacob Alleman was born March 27, 1811 in Pennsylvania. He was the son of Valentine and Barbara Alleman. Valentine died in 1840 in Delaware Township, Juniata County, and Jacob was named administrator of his fathers [sic] estate. Family records indicate the land was rented to Charles Shields for \$55.00 per year while in the estate. Jacob married Sarah McLinn (born January 21, 1815; died May 6, 1883). She was born in Juniata County, Pennsylvania and was the youngest of eight children.

Jacob was a farmer and a carpenter. As a carpenter he was mostly a bridge and barn builder. Family tradition tells of a covered bridge of several spans he helped build across the Juniata River at Thompsontown, Pennsylvania where he lived. It appears he went to church at Mexico, Pennsylvania. In a letter dated July 8, 1901 from M.A. Dietrick of Patterson, Pennsylvania to Jacob Horace Allaman (Jacobs [sic] son) Mr Dietrick states "I will answer some of your questions. Thompsontown is twelve miles from Mifflin, three miles from Mexico where your father and mother went to church and you were baptized.

Jacob moved his family to Illinois by railroad in 1858. A note in his son Calvin Ard's "Student's Exercise Book" reads as follows: "Thompsontown, Juniata County, Jacob Allaman and family left Thompsontown, Juniata County April 27 2 o'clock 48 min. in the afternoon in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred fifty eight."

Jacob bought 40 acres (NE1/4 NE1/4 Sec.20 11N 4W) when he arrived in Illinois from George Washington Lofftus. The contract was dated July 1, 1858 stating the purchase

price as being \$1300 for the tract with possession of the house to be given on or before October 1, 1858.

Jacob engaged in farming and practiced his carpentry trade in Illinois. On December 1, 1866 Jacob sold the above mentioned tract of land to William Marble for \$2000 and bought the 80 acres across the road east from James Duke for \$5740 (N1/2 NW1/4 Sec. 21 11N 4W). At the same time Calvin purchased the 80 acres just to the south of Jacobs from James Duke for \$3050.

Jacob built a number of barns and bridges after moving here. Of course the best known structure remaining is the covered bridge north of Gladstone across Henderson Creek.

Vol. C Page 171 of the Henderson County Commission Record Book reads as follows: "The Court this day proceeded to open specifications and proposals received pursuant to notice for the building of a bridge at the site of the old Eames Bridge across main Henderson and upon examination of all proposals submitted it is considered and ordered by the court that the proposition of Jacob Allaman to furnish material and to construct the woodwork as per plan submitted by him, for the sum of Two Thousand One hundred and twenty five Dollars; and the proposal of Frisby Sloan to furnish stone and construct the stone work for Two dollars and forty cents per perch, be and the same are hereby accepted; the said Allaman and Sloan to enter into contracts respectively, within ten days from this day, for the faithful performance of their work, said contracts to contain specific details as to materials to be used, when work is to be completed etc. and to be approved by the County Judge and filed in the office of the Clerk of this Court."

An article in the April 19, 1866 Oquawka Spectator reads as follows: "At a recent term of the County Court, a bid was accepted for putting up a substantial covered bridge with stone abutments, to take the place of the ricketty [sic] affair now known as the played out Eames bridge across Henderson Creek. The contract for the stone work was let to Mr. Frisby Sloan of this place upon his bid of \$2.40 per perch; and Mr. C.A. Allaman of Greenville (Rozetta) does the woodwork for which he gets \$2125 the amount of his bid. (perhaps Calvin presented the bid for his father) The work is to be commenced and completed as soon as possible, It cannot be done too soon, for the present structure is hardly safe for travel."

According to Jacob's ledger, the bridge was built in August and September of 1866 with the following men on the crew: Jacob Allaman, Hervey Brimhall (son in law), Edwin Harrop (son in law), Calvin Ard Allaman (son), and Henry Allaman (nephew).

Family tradition states that the beams and rafters for the bridge were cut at the lumber yard in Oquawka. Patterns were used to mark the cuts on the various beams and these patterns are now in the possession of Charles Allaman, great-grandson of Jacob.

After the members were cut to shape, they were hauled to the bridge site and the bridge was erected. Jacob Horace Allaman, then a boy of 16 drove one of the wagons hauling the material.

On Sunday, July 11, 1982 the covered bridge was swept off its foundation in a flood in which debris piled up against its upstream side. It lodged under the Route 164 highway bridge a short distance downstream, State highway workers and volunteers from the Henderson County Historical Society were able to salvage nearly all of the bridge and store it at a nearby State Highway Garage, The Historical Society hopes to have the bridge reconstructed as soon as possible.

Another remaining structure built by Jacob is the old granary on the Chares Allaman farm. It has been moved from its original site on the hill north of his house to an area east of his driveway. It is still as straight as when it was built.

Other work done in Henderson County according to Jacob's ledgers are as follows: bridge across South Henderson near Oquawka Junction (Gladstone) in 1867. Repaired Davenport bridge and Ward Mill bridge in 1867. Barn on Musgove farm (now Clarence Woods farm). He also built barns in Henderson County for James Junkin, James Duke, Grahams, Musgove, William Campbell, James Reed, Michel and John Findly, Samuel Pickron, Clark Hannah, and Andrew Jonkins.

A letter among Jacob's documents indicates he had contracted to build a covered bridge near Keithsburg in 1868. He never built this bridge however as he died Friday June 5, 1868. He and his wife are buried in the Rozetta Cemetery on Lot 73.

Children of Jacob and Sarah were: 1. Martha Jane 2. Sarah Ann 3. Calvin Ard 4. Elwood Darwin 5. Mary L. 6. Jacob Horace 7. Rebeca Elizabeth 8. David Arelious.

4413. Valentine was born in Juniata County Pennsylvania on December 22, 1822. He married Rachel Essick (born July 1825; died 1892) on June 5, 1845. He lived about 3 miles east of Thompsontown Pennsylvania until the spring of 1858 when they moved by train to Henderson County, Illinois. Valentine was a farmer and carpenter. He helped his brother Jacob build several buildings in Henderson County. He built and lived in the house on the farm NW1/4 SW1/4 Sec. 34 T12N 4W Henderson County. Valentine died in 1885. He and his wife are buried in Fall Creek Cemetery, Henderson County Illinois,

44131. John William was born April 6, 1846 in Juniata County, Pennsylvania, During the Civil War he enlisted in Company L 12th Illinois Cavalry. He died of brain fever at

Camp Parapet near New Orleans on April 22, 1864, He is buried in the National Cemetery at Stone [sic] River, Tennessee.

44132, Phiana born October 11, 1847; died June 11, 1851.

44133. Sarah Catherine was born February 13, 1850. She married James P. Clark. She is buried on the family lot in Fall Creek Cemetery.

44134. Jacob Darwin was born on October 29, 1851. He married Etta Dennis. Jacob farmed and taught school in Henderson County. He died on December 12, 1932 and is buried in the Rozetta Cemetery.

Children were: 1. Harry 2. Lela (married Arthur Butler) 3. Rolla

44135. James Rufus was born on June 8, 1854. He married Ida Staly of Oquawka, Illinois, and operated a grocery store at 905 South Main Street, Monmouth Illinois. He died February 5, 1913 and is buried in Monmouth Cemetery.

44136. Mary Emma was born March 7, 1857. She married William Cage on February 28, 1888. She died December 7, 1938 and is buried in Monmouth Cemetery. She had one child, Minnie

44137. Rachael Ann was born November 5, 1858. She married Charles Johnson and moved to South Dakota. They had no children. She died June 26, 1944 and is buried in Monmouth Cemetery.

44138. Son, born December 16, 1862; died January 10, 1863.

44139. Joseph Valentine was born January 14, 1865. He married 1. Sadie Cage. Children were 1. Inez (died in flu epidemic of World War I). 2. Lee 3. Eva (Ring). His second marriage was to Rhuie Breckbill. They had one daughter, Marie, who had no children. Joseph (Joe) farmed all his life E1/2 NE1/4 Sec.8 Rozetta Township, Henderson County. He died April 27, 1947 and is buried in the Rozetta Cemetery.

4413(10). David Augustus was born November 1866. He married Laura B. Lukens on May 2, 1993 [sic] and operated a general store at Reed in Henderson County before moving to Monmouth where he operated a store. He died August 5, 1947 and is buried in Monmouth Cemetery.

4414. Valentine the first had at least one other son whose name I have not found. This son married Catherine Miller who was born in Reading Pennsylvania in 1820.

Children were: 1. William 2. Charlotte 3. Henry 4. George R.

Catherine's first husband, ([misisng] Allaman), died at Thompsontown Pennsylvania. She later married Solomon Lauver on May 2, 1852. Shortly before the Civil War, William and Henry Allaman came to Henderson County where they enlisted in the Union Army when the fighting started. Catherine with her second husband and family moved to Henderson County in 1863. Dale Lauver of Stronghurst and James Lauver of Kirkwood are descendants of her second marriage.

44141. William J. Allaman was born in 1840 in Pennsylvania, probably Juniata County, Shortly before the Civil War he came to Henderson County. At the beginning of the War he enlisted as a Private in Company R of the 84th Regiment of Illinois Volunteers under the command of Captain J. B. McGaw. He joined the Company at its organization at Biggsville, Illinois on August 8th 1862 and was officially mustered into the Union Army at Quincy, Illinois on September 1, 1862.

On December 31, 1862 William was wounded by a ball shattering his ankle in the battle of Stones River near Murfreesboro Tennessee. He died as a result of the wound in a field hospital near Murfreesboro on January 8, 1863.

Following is a letter written by W. H. Stockton to William's first cousin Calvin Allaman dated February 8, 1863.

Letter to Calvin Allaman
"Dear Schoolmate

Your letter of inquiry was received today and I hasten to answer it.

Wm. Allaman died the 8th of Jan. He was wounded in the ankle, the ball went square through the bone shattering it badly; he also received a slight wound in the shoulder. The doctors thought they could save his leg without amputating it. I saw him about three hours before he died and talked considerable with him, he seemed in good spirits and I think he had no idea that his time had come to die. I had strong hopes myself that he would get well. I did not wait on him but I know that he had a good nurse.

He was buried without a coffin with only his blanket wrapped around him. He made no request that I know of before he died. He lies in an orchard adjoining the second division hospital. I cut his name on a board and placed it at his head. I think it would be impossible now to move his body. If it were you could not get him for the military authorities will give no passes for that purpose.

Esq, Martin has been after orderly Plummer's body but as yet has not succeeded in getting it. William's things will be sent to his brother Henry who is at Nashville. The boys of our neighborhood who are here are all well. Ira B., Michael J., and George S. are at

Nashville. H. Maley is at Gallatin. I believe I have answered all your questions. I would like to hear from you again soon.

W. H, Stockton"

Evidently Williams body was never moved as it is not in the Stones River National Cemetery.

44143. Henry Allaman was born in 1843 in Juniata County, Pennsylvania. Shortly before the Civil War he came to Henderson County Illinois. At the start of the war he enlisted at Oquawka in Company E of the 10'th Illinois Volunteer Infantry. There are quite a few letters in our family that Henry wrote to his cousin Calvin telling of his experiences in the army. Among the places he describes are Camp Defiance at Cairo Illinois, Mound City Illinois, Fort Negley near Nashville Tennessee, Camp Big Spring near Corinth Mississippi, Tuscumsa [sic] Alabama, Camp 9 miles from Atlanta Georgia, Camp East Point Georgia, and Beaufort S.C.

Henry was captured March 21, 1865 in action near Bentonville, North Carolina. His pension application reads as follows:

"In the line of his duty at Bentonville in the State of North Carolina on or about the 21'st day of March, 1865, he being in the battle at Bentonville was wounded, a ball passing through his neck. He fell and became insensible, and on recovery found himself in the hands of the enemy who took him to their field hospital at Greenville N.C. where he stayed about four weeks and thence was taken as a prisoner to Salisbury N.C. when on Lee's surrender he was taken to his regiment at Raleigh having been a prisoner 49 days."

At the close of the Civil War, Henry was honorably discharged at Louisville, Kentucky on July 4, 1865. Following his discharge he returned to Henderson County where he farmed and helped his uncle Jacob Allaman as a carpenter.

On October 2, 1866 Henry married Elizabeth P. Brown (born November 6, 1845; died 1924) by Judge Etting at Oquawka, Illinois. Henry died December 15, 1883 of pneumonia. He and his wife are buried in Kirkwood cemetery.

Children were: 1. Cora M. (b.1868 d.1943) 2.Alta L. (b.1872 d.1893) 3.Eva M. (b.1874 d. [unknown]).

44144. Little is known about George R. Allaman except for two letters he wrote his cousin Calvin from Peru in Howard County Kansas. In his first letter dated February 20, 1871, he tells of leaving Oquawka on October 6, 1870. While traveling through Missouri,

he says "we concluded to go to the northern part of Kansas and look at the Pacific R. R. lands, but at Pleasant Hill Mo. through the influence of a snow storm changed our course for a more congenial climate and as the song says "Where no storms ever sweep o'er that beautiful land and the years ever pleasantly roll". But ah! while I write our hopes are blighted. The storm is raging in its mighty fury, the wind howls in its mysterious language and I, am thus left to weep. One of your Northerners strayed from it's [sic] natural element and comes down upon us like night and despair seals our blighted hopes."

At another place in the letter he describes the area where he has settled. "One year ago the fifth of Nov. last on Sunday we camped for the first time along the Caney, of course the Promised Land. This country was then a wild, uninhabited place except by the Osages only. Although uncivilized, it presented a pleasing picture for the eye. To follow the meanderings of this beautiful stream Caney with it's [sic] pure and sparkling waters as it gently glided on it's [sic] course, the heavy and luxurious growth of vegetation o'er those fertile bottoms and the hills covered with timber rising from the valley in a gradual slope and sometimes more abruptly were inducements enough for us to locate. But today to stand on the same eminence a different aspect presents itself to us. The upturned earth, the numerous cottages (log houses of course), crowing of roosters, the shrill whistle of the steam sawmills and the village on the hill yonder are evidence enough of this."

In his second letter from "Bachelor's Misery" dated Friday, June 9, 1871, he comments further; "Weather remarkably fine, the best growing season I have ever seen. It rains about every three days and sunshine between showers. Corn looks well. We will have roasting ears by the first of July. I have about 11 acres of corn, all that I got broke last year. I haven't put in any sod corn this year. Probably in the course of events I can farm on a larger scale.

The soil in these bottoms along the Caney is as rich as any soil I have ever seen; a black, loamy, very deep soil. I have seen 2 tons and 1/2 of hay cut off an acre on my claim. It wasn't weighed but it was the judgement of a good many men that had weighed hay. The bulk was there.

We can't tell yet what it is best adapted to, but dirt that produces such luxurious vegetation as today I look across the valley and see moving like the billows on the ocean must evidently grow better when cultivated. There is no hard pan or clay subsoil here.

The soil is not so good on the uplands, it is more shallow yet there is the best of grazing. Along the hills for a mile after it raises from the valleys is generally sand rock yet the soil between the rocks looks black and grows good grass. From thence back this

plate lime stone takes its place. To look over the country, there is not a stone to be seen. The grass hides them all.

There is plenty of good water. I have a spring on my claim about 50 yds. from my house.

My claim is 1 1/2 miles west of the County Seat, the City of Peru. The town is improving very fast. The first term of circuit [sic] Court was held here two weeks ago. We had a little indian [sic] fracas here a couple of weeks ago on the line 6 miles south of here. 2 indians [sic] killed and one white. Considerable excitement.

I suppose we will soon have to deed. Some say the land office will be open the 12th of June. The instructions are we will have to deed right away. I hope they will give us another year. I want to make a home here. I love the country and I love the people. I have encountered the roughness of a frontier life and been deprived of many privileges [sic] society gives and if this government is a friend to the poor man it's no poor man's government."

44121. Martha Jane (born December 30, 1836; married March 17, 1856; died June 25, 1886) was Jacob Allaman's first child. She married Edmond H. Harrop in Juniata County, Pennsylvania. In 1857 they moved to Illinois for 8 years, where he engaged in farming. Edmond and Martha moved to Kansas October 12, 1865; first to Soldier Township, Shawnee County. They next moved to Tecumseh, Kansas in March 1867 (present vicinity of 324 Rice Road). They owned 28 acres of land, all orchard and small fruit. He rented and farmed 132 acres in addition. Martha is buried in Bethel Cemetery, Shawnee County, Kansas.

44122. Sarah Ann (born January 30, 1838) No record.

44123. Calvin Ard (born January 30, 1841; died January 21, 1873). Calvin helped his father farm and work at the carpenter trade. He bought the 80 acres (S1/2 NW 1/4 Sec 21) Rozetta Twp. south of where his father lived. Calvin was engaged to be married to Emily Gates at the time of his death. According to my father, Calvin and Hervy Brimhall built the house on the land he owned south of where Charles Allaman now lives; and Calvin planned to live in it after he married. A desk now owned by Lynne (Allaman) Craig once belonged to him. He is buried in the Rozetta Cemetery in Lot 73.

44124. Elwood Darwin (born March 21, 1844) No Record.

44125. Mary L, (born April 27, 1846; married November 1, 1866; died May 5, 1920). Mary Allaman married Hervey Brimhall; the son of Samuel and Caroline (Mills) Brimhall. He served in the Civil War as a private in Company K, 84th Illinois Infantry and took part in the battle of Stones River at Murfreesboro, Tennessee.

After the war he returned to Henderson County and worked as a carpenter for several years. The covered bridge near Gladstone is one of the structures he helped Jacob Allaman build.

After Jacobs [sic] death he farmed in Sec. 21 of Rozetta Township. He and Mary lived in the house he had helped Calvin Allaman build. One of the rosebushes Mary Brimhall planted is still living north of the house. My father called it the "Aunt Mary Brimhall Rose". Both Mary and Hervey Brimhall are buried in the Rozetta Cemetery, Lot 25.

Children were: 1. Ida M. 2. Ross 3. H. Elmer 4. Frank A. 5. Carie B. 6. Leroy B.

441251. Ida Brimhall (born October 31, 1867; died June 10, 1935). She married Gideon T. Dixon who farmed in Rozetta Twp.

Children were:

1. Elsie B. (born September 10, 1893) married George Thornton of Oquawka on June 5, 1920.

2. Leslie H. (born January 12, 1897; died November 7, 1970) first married Ruth Stock on October 11, 1934. Ruth died March 2, 1947. Leslie then married Anna Porter Hayes on June 7, 1951. Leslie had no children. He is buried in Monmouth Memorial Park Cemetery and his widow is now living in Denver Colorado.

3. Ruby L. (born March 20, 1902; married Max Fryrear). They have one daughter Janet who married Don Foley. Janet and Don live in Monmouth Illinois.

4. Ruth M. (born December 30, 1907; married Merwin Smith).

5. Gillette B. (born August 15, 1909; married Majorie Noble) and Leland B (twin, who died April 1, 1961).

441252. Ross Brimhall (born January 19, 1871; died February 16, 1947) married Fannie Andrews. They had one son, Merle.

441253. H. Elmer Brimhall (born August 2, 1875).

441254. Frank A. Brimhall (born February 9, 1879; died June 17, 1914) married Merle White. They had one daughter who died as a child. After Franks [sic] death, Merle married Benjamin C. Duke. Frank Brimhall is buried in the Rozetta Cemetery.

441255. Carey (Brimhall) Abbey (born April 24, 1884; died October 11, 1951) married Lauren Abbey of Springfield, Illinois.

441256. Leroy B. Brimhall (born November 6, 1885; died 1952) married Fern Smith (born 1891; died 1968) and had two daughters, Beulah and Bernice. Beulah married Leland Allen, Monmouth Illinois. Roy and his wife are buried in the Rozetta Cemetery.

44126. Jacob Horace Allaman (born February 21, 1849; died October 23, 1922) married Virginia (Jenny) C. Loftus on January 15, 1874. She was the daughter of George Washington Lottfus, who lived across the road and west (SE 1/2 SW 1/4 Sec.17, Rozetta Township) from where Robert Meyer now lives. I believe the Lofftus family came from Virginia. They settled in Christian County Kentucky before moving to Henderson County in 1842.

George Washington Lofftus was foreman in charge of construction of the brick Liberty School building at Rozetta in 1856, and was a member of the first board of trustees of the Fall Creek Baptist Church of Christ (now the Rozetta Baptist Church).

Sisters of Virginia Lofftus were 1. Jane B. (born Christian County Kentucky February 23, 1836). On December 24, 1854 she married Edwin A. Gilbert. She and her husband moved to near Washington Iowa and were parents to ten children. Children were Irene Hornbeck, Ella, Mrs. Mamie B. Auchard (of Clay Center Kansas), Harry (of Veblen S. Dakota), Rose (of Sharon Springs Kansas), George E., H. Greely, and Fanny. Jane died December 22, 1920 at Washington, Iowa. Her husband was killed in a run-a-way team accident.

Rose Lofftus (born March 7, 1853; died October 13, 1888) married Azro Record. They moved to Iowa. A letter written October 29, 1890 has the heading "A. M. Record and C. S. King, Dealers in Hogs and Cattle and All Kinds of Grain, Aurora, Iowa". Children were Nell, Grace, Blanche, and Howard. During their latter years, the three sisters lived in a large house just west of downtown Rock Island, Illinois. Blanche worked as an Osteopathic doctor.
