I am on my way home. Concluded I would let you no [sic] what I have don [sic] I bought corn as it only cost (100) one dollar per bushel laid down in Macon not including sacks it is the prettyest [sic] lot of white corn that I ever saw I maid [sic] arrangements with the Farmers that I bought from to get Ten Thousand bushels at the same price provided I will let them hear from me soon the sooner the farmers by [sic] the better for thare [sic] byeing [sic] I will try and com [sic] over soon but you had better see the parties that want corn and let me hear from you for they will not wait long or see about the corn up the county
