21 bears were hit by vehicles in Yosemite last year.



You are driving in wildlife habitat. Follow posted speed limits, drive carefully, and watch for animals crossing the road. "Red Bear, Dead Bear" signs on park roads mark places where bears have been hit.

Pets are NOT allowed on hiking trails.



Pets are ONLY permitted on paved walking and biking paths, in most campgrounds, and in parking areas. Pets must be leashed at all times. Properly dispose of pet waste. Turn to pages 10 & 11 for pet-friendly walks in Yosemite Valley.

Service dogs are allowed anywhere that visitors can go. A service dog is trained to perform a specific task to assist a person with a disability. Emotional support, therapy, and companion animals are all subject to pet regulations.

Park Regulations

The National Park Service is dedicated to protecting Yosemite for the benefit and enjoyment of future generations. Regulations are in place to protect both visitors and park resources.

Prohibited activities include:

- Using drones
- Feeding or approaching wildlife
- Collecting plants and animals
- Hunting animals
- Picking up archaeological items, such as arrowheads
- Using metal detectors
- Driving vehicles into meadows
- Biking off of paved roads
- Camping outside of designated campgrounds
- Possession of weapons inside federal facilities
- Possession or using marijuana, including medical marijuana



Things to Know

Expect Yosemite Valley to be busy.

Arrive early to avoid long lines at entrances and to find parking more easily. Park in one of three main Valley parking areas (Curry Village, Yosemite Village, or Yosemite Falls) and walk, bike, or use free shuttles to reach trailheads and other Valley destinations. *Turn to page 6 for a shuttle map.*

Some high-elevation areas of the park are still snowy.

Even in early summer, expect high-elevation trails to be snowy or muddy, especially when hiking from Tioga Road. Unbridged water crossings may be difficult or dangerous. Ask a ranger about trail conditions before you go. You can also find trail updates at [go.nps.gov/wildconditions](https://www.nps.gov/wildconditions).

Waterfalls peak during spring snowmelt.

Peak runoff typically happens in May or June, with some waterfalls (including Yosemite Falls) only a trickle or completely dry by August.

Be aware of summer thunderstorms.

Check the weather forecast before you go, and pay attention to conditions while hiking. Stay off granite domes and other high-elevation, exposed places during storms, when there is a high risk of lightning strikes. Take shelter in a building or hard-topped vehicle when possible.



Peak-Hours Reservations

A reservation is required to drive into or pass through Yosemite between 6 am and 2 pm on some dates in 2025:

DAILY JUNE 15 – AUGUST 15 + LABOR DAY WEEKEND (AUGUST 30 – SEPTEMBER 1)





Visitors can enter Yosemite with a peak-hours reservation OR a wilderness or Half Dome permit OR in-park camping, lodging, or vacation rental OR regional transit or tour group.

It is illegal to approach or feed any wild animal in Yosemite, including birds and squirrels.



DISTANCE FROM WILDLIFE: 150 feet = about four bus-lengths.

Wildlife can cause injuries and transmit diseases. Human food is unhealthy for wild animals. Animals used to being fed can become dangerous and be killed as a result.

Stay at least 150 ft (46 m) from bears and coyotes.

Stay at least 25 ft (8 m) from all other wildlife.



Keep Bears Wild: Proper Food Storage is Required by Federal Law

To a bear, "food" also includes trash, toiletries, and anything else with a scent. All must be properly stored.

☀ During the Day

While hiking or picnicking, always keep your food within arm's reach. When away from your vehicle, lock it and keep all windows closed, with food, drinks, and coolers hidden from sight. Never leave food in a truck bed or strapped to the outside of a vehicle.

🌙 At Night


Bears can easily break into vehicles. **Food, trash, and other scented items may NOT be stored inside vehicles overnight.** These items must be kept inside a food locker or in a hotel room or hard-sided cabin with doors and windows closed. Food may also be stored inside a completely hard-sided RV with all windows and doors closed.

YOSEMITE VALLEY



Yosemite Valley is famous for its waterfalls, towering granite walls, and iconic features like El Capitan and Half Dome.

TIOGA ROAD & TUOLUMNE MEADOWS



The trip across Tioga Road offers a 39-mile scenic drive past forests, meadows, lakes, and granite domes. Tuolumne Meadows embodies the Sierra Nevada high country, the Tuolumne River winding through domes, peaks, and peaceful meadows. It's also the jumping-off point for many hikes, whether you venture out for a day or a week.

DIRECTIONS 1.5 hours from Yosemite Valley. Drive 16 mi/26 km north on Big Oak Flat Rd to Crane Flat. Turn right onto Tioga Rd. Continue 39 mi/63 km to Tuolumne Meadows.

This area of the park is very remote, so plan ahead. Little or no cell service. No gas. Limited grocery & gifts: turn to page 5.

THINGS TO DO

- Olmsted Point** Stop at this popular roadside overlook with excellent views of Half Dome, Clouds Rest, and Tenaya Lake.
- Tenaya Lake** Enjoy a picnic, a walk, or a chilly dip in the lake!
- Soda Springs** Take a scenic stroll through the heart of Tuolumne Meadows, with views of the river and surrounding domes and peaks.
- Enjoy a longer hike in Yosemite Wilderness** If you have time, explore one of the many scenic trails in this area! Stop by the Tuolumne Meadows Visitor Center for maps, recommendations, and current trail information.

HETCH HETCHY



Walk across the O'Shaughnessy Dam, hike along the reservoir, or access Yosemite's Wilderness. Pick up a free map brochure at the entrance station for information about trails. **Open sunrise to sunset only.**

Swimming and boating are not permitted in the reservoir. Pets are not allowed on the dam or on trails.

DIRECTIONS Located 38 mi (61 km) or 1.5 hours from Yosemite Valley. Take Big Oak Flat Road to the Big Oak Flat Entrance. Just after exiting the park, turn right on Evergreen Road. Follow signs to Hetch Hetchy entrance. *Vehicles and trailers over 25 ft long and 8 ft wide are not permitted on Hetch Hetchy Rd.*

CRANE FLAT



Hike to two quiet sequoia groves near the Big Oak Flat Entrance.

DIRECTIONS 16 mi/26 km (30 min) from Yosemite Valley, on Big Oak Flat Road.

THINGS TO DO

- Tuolumne Grove of Giant Sequoias** Trailhead located on Tioga Rd, just north of Crane Flat. Hike 2 mi/3.2 km (roundtrip) to the grove. Add an optional 0.5-mi/0.8-km loop around the nature trail. Expect a steep climb of 500 ft/150 m on the return to the trailhead.
- Merced Grove of Giant Sequoias**
A very small and quiet sequoia grove. From the trailhead on Big Oak Flat Rd, hike 3 mi/4.8 km (roundtrip) to the grove. Expect a steep climb of 520 ft/160 m on the return to the trailhead.

GLACIER POINT



Take in stunning views of Yosemite Valley, Half Dome, and the high Sierra.

DIRECTIONS 1 hour from Yosemite Valley. Drive south on Wawona Road for 9 mi/14 km. Turn left onto Glacier Point Road and continue for 16 mi/26 km.

THINGS TO DO

- Glacier Point Overlook** Enjoy spectacular views of the Valley floor, 3,200 ft below, as well as Half Dome and the high Sierra. Paved, wheelchair-accessible path.
- Sentinel Dome & Taft Point** Starting from the trailhead on Glacier Point Rd, hike 2.4 mi/3.9 km (roundtrip) west to Taft Point, a scenic overlook along the Valley rim. From the same trailhead, hike 1.8 mi/3 km (roundtrip) northeast to Sentinel Dome. *Map on page 11.*

WAWONA & MARIPOSA GROVE



Explore giant sequoias, meadows, and the South Fork Merced River near Yosemite's South Entrance.

DIRECTIONS From Yosemite Valley, drive south on the Wawona Rd for 30 mi (48 km), or about one hour.



THINGS TO DO

- Yosemite History Center** Explore the early days of tourism in Yosemite. Outdoor exhibits open daily.
- Wawona Meadow Loop** Starting across from the Wawona Hotel, enjoy a mostly-flat, pet-friendly 3.5-mile loop around the scenic meadow.
- Mariposa Grove of Giant Sequoias**
Visit Yosemite's largest sequoia grove and explore miles of scenic trails. Shuttles run from the parking area to the grove daily from 8 am to 7 pm. *Turn to page 7 for more shuttle information.*

CAMPING There is NO first-come, first-served camping in Yosemite. To reserve a campsite, visit Recreation.gov or call 877/444-6777.


Sleeping overnight in a parking lot or on the side of the road is **NOT** permitted. Sleeping inside a vehicle is only allowed at a registered campsite.

Transportation

Yosemite Valley Shuttle System



Yosemite Valley shuttles are FREE and operate from 7 am to 10 pm daily. No ticket required.

Valleywide Shuttle (green)

Serves ALL stops. Runs approx. every 22 – 32 min. Round-trip time of 1.5 hours.

East Valley Shuttle (purple)

Serves east Valley destinations ONLY. Runs approx. every 18 – 22 min. Round-trip time of 50 min.

Parking

In Yosemite Valley, use one of three main parking areas: **Curry Village** (14, 19), **Yosemite Village** (1), or **Yosemite Falls** (7). Parking can completely fill by late morning on weekends and holidays. Once you find a parking space, keep it. Walk, bike, or ride a shuttle to trailheads and other destinations.

Park only in designated parking spaces or in a paved turnout, pulled completely off the road. Vehicles parked on vegetation or blocking traffic are subject to citation and may be towed.

Bicycling in Yosemite

Where to Ride Enjoy several miles of scenic, paved bike paths through Yosemite Valley. Bicycles are also allowed on park roads (cyclists must obey traffic laws.) Bicycles are NOT allowed on hiking trails. The speed limit on bike paths is 15 mph. Helmets are required by law for children under 18.

Rentals Bicycles are available for full-day and half-day rentals (turn to pages 4 & 5 for hours and locations.) Standard adult & children's bikes are first-come, first-served. Bikes with trailers are available at Yosemite Valley Lodge and Curry Village only. ADA bicycles are available by reservation: call 209/372-1208.

E-bikes with two or three wheels, fully operable pedals, and electric motors less than 750 watts (1 horsepower) are allowed everywhere bicycles are allowed.







Valley Trails

Know Before You Go

- Pets are NOT allowed on hiking trails.** Pets are only permitted on paved biking and walking paths, in most campgrounds, and in parking areas. Keep pets on a leash at all times, and properly dispose of pet waste. *Service dogs are permitted anywhere that visitors can go.*
- Proper food storage is required by law.** Bears can easily break into vehicles to obtain food. During the day, food must be hidden from sight inside a locked vehicle with all windows and vents completely shut. At night, food, trash, and other scented items must be removed from vehicles and stored in a bear-resistant locker.
- View wildlife from a distance.** It is dangerous and illegal to approach or feed any wild animal, including birds and squirrels. Don't let wildlife steal your snacks: keep your backpack and food within arm's reach at all times.

- Stay on the trail.** Protect fragile vegetation and avoid getting lost or injured by staying on designated trails. Stay behind barriers, don't shortcut switchbacks, and never enter water above waterfalls.
- Pack it out.** Most trails do not have trash cans or restrooms, so plan ahead when possible. Human waste must be deposited at least 200 feet from trails and water. Solid waste must be buried six inches deep. Pack out ALL trash, including fruit peels and toilet paper.
- Leave behind what you find.** It is illegal to remove natural objects or artifacts from the park. Instead, take a photo to remember your find!


